## Outreach 'Shout Outs'


Some of our young people have challenges that mean they are not able to attend a centre. These students are supported by our fabulous team of Outreach Teachers and Learning Mentors.

Here are some of their successes this term:

- One student passed his construction exam at level 2, and his score was one of the highest in his school. He will achieve a level 2 construction merit by the end of the school year.
- Two students completed their medical treatment and went back into school.
- One student is integrating into Ludlow centre, and one more is starting to visit with the view to start integration too.
- 6 students were able to sit their GCSE examinations either in school, centre or at home.
- ♦ One student created a vegetable garden at home independently and achieved a level 1 unit award for sustainable gardening.
- ♦ One year 11 student completed 33 unit awards this year in Maths and English.

## PRIMARY PUPILS COME FOR AN 'EXPERIMENTAL' VISIT

Harlescott primary centre students made a visit to Hookagate and had the chance to conduct some scientific investigations in the laboratory.

The pupils used gas jars, pipettes and different liquids to make a *Liquid Density Tower*. They were really skilled measuring out the different liquids to form different coloured towers. Effervescent tablets were added to the tower causing a fizzing reaction in the water layer.

Our second experiment used
