
A Word form the Headteacher...

Oswestry students have been getting practical in the science lab!

LUNG DISSECTION



Students in KS4 at the Oswestry Centre were studying the process of Osmosis in science. They placed an egg in vinegar to dissolve the egg shell. Students then measured the egg before putting it into water. The egg will then stay in the water for seven days. Students will measure the egg again to see if Osmosis has occurred. Eggciting!



Students at the Oswestry centre have been studying Gas Exchange and the function of the lungs. They took part in an experiment where they dissected the lungs to see inside them. They then took turns inflating the lungs, whilst discussing how Gas Exchange occurs.



REMEMBRANCE DAY

As part of Remembrance Day this year, pupils from Hook a Gate, Bridgnorth and Oswestry created artwork based on the poem 'In Flanders fields'. They incorporated the symbol of the poppy, and words from the poem. This earned all those involved an Entry Level AQA unit Award, and created thoughtful displays for centres. Year 10 students also studied the poem for English. All students observed an exemplary two minute silence.

AN EGGCELLENT SCIENCE LESSON!




This half term, as part of Black History month, pupils from Hookagate, Oswestry and Bridgnorth centres watched a dramatization of the story of Rosa Parks as a stimulus for their art. They discussed segregation and created portraits of key figures from Black history. They then created displays for their centres to celebrate black history month.



BLACKOUT POETRY

Hook a Gate pupils created 'Blackout Poems' in Art to mark poetry day this year. They selected a photocopy of a book from their page centre library and then blacked out the words except for the ones they wanted to construct their poem from. It was amazing to see how different the poems were, using the same selection of texts as a starting point.





ATTINGHAM PARK

Students from Sundorne Centre visited Attingham Park, a National Trust property and park in Shrewsbury.



We are very lucky to have such a fantastic NT visitor site so near to our Shrewsbury centres. Students visited the mansion and used the centre camera to take photographs of the grounds and the different rooms, such as the kitchen and the butler's room. They experimented with angles,

lighting and landscape settings.



The end of term sees the retirement of one of TMBSS's longest serving staff. Mr Rudge is retiring at Christmas after 26 years at TMBSS. Mr Rudge started with the service back in October 1996, working at the old Hookagate centre. He has been managing the 'New' Hookagate since 2013. As well as teaching science. Perhaps Mr Rudge's greatest achievement in his time at TMBSS is his incredible contribution to Outdoor Education. This term saw the return of School Council. Each centre nominated two students to represent them at the School Council meeting. This is the opportunity to share any concerns, hopes, ideas the students have regarding all aspects of their schooling at TMBSS. It is also a chance for students meet their peers from other centres.

It is a huge responsibility -taking on the role of Councillor for your centre-as you are there to represent the view of all the pupils, not just your own. In centres, the councillors were given the time to talk to their peers about the issues they wanted raising in the meeting and they were able to discuss these with Mr Savchenko, who will then address them with the rest of the Senior Leadership Team.

Lower Bush Farm near Ludlow offers a warm, fun and friendly option for KS3 pupils who are interested in practical activities away from Centre. This term students have been involved in building a fort made from wood which was designed collaboratively to 'keep enemies out'.

DH from Bridgnorth Centre played a key role in the construction project. He explained that the hardest part was having to knock in the extra posts, while the best bit was the fact that everyone mixed in and worked together. DH goes to Lower Bush Farm every Friday and has learned new skills while also using his knowledge of The Outdoors to help others. This term he has also made spears out of wood, metal spear heads and used a bench drill to craft candle holders for Christmas presents.

MOVING ON, MOVING UP

Coming to TMBSS can be a really daunting experience. At Bridgnorth Centre, one Y10 pupil has excelled during his time in the Service and he agreed to sharing his thoughts about the last few months as he prepares to say goodbye.

"Centre has been different to what I was expecting. I thought it was going to be bad because it doesn't have a very good reputation around Bridgnorth. The first couple of days were difficult because I didn't know anyone and it wasn't anything like mainstream. I soon got to know everyone though and that has been really positive".

TL has worked hard to refocus since his arrival at BEC and staff were able to provide a really positive report to support his move back to mainstream school.

"I am nervous about getting back to mainstream, but hope that my next school will be one where I know a couple of people already".

Although the vast majority of pupils don't want to come to TMBSS and have often had a difficult journey to get to us, many find that when the moment comes, they are really sad to leave. Bridgnorth Centre is proud of its former pupils, many of whom keep in touch and drop in to share their news from time to time. Last year one pupil who left us in 2015 was awarded her Masters Degree in Criminology while others have set up their own businesses or are simply settled and happy with families and everyday lives.

HOW DO WE SUPPORT **READING AT TMBSS?**



Personalised **Strategies**

very student has a reading profile that contains helpful strategies that can be used by all subject teachers to support reading across the curriculum

Challenge

Students are encouraged and frequently given the opportunity to read complex academic texts in all subjects

Guided Reading

Teachers use methods of guided reading to explore a wide range of texts



Reading is monitored and re-assessed to measure progress over time. This allows us to adapt and amend interventions appropriately



Assess



Baseline assessments help us to work out the 'reading age' of all of our students. This gives us a clear starting point and helps us to identify who needs support and who needs extra challenge

Attitudes Survey



We explore how our students feel Dabout reading and what their views about themselves as readers

Interventions are used to help students 'close the gap'. These might be delivered in class, in a small group, or sometimes on a one to one basis



Targeted Support



Students are explicitly taught vocabulary in all subjects to build confidence and aid comprehension

Model positivity

Staff model positive reading habits and encourage reading for pleasure
